Tip Sheet – A Checklist for Taking a Safe Road Trip During Covid-19

Here's a checklist on how to safely road-trip this summer during the pandemic.

1. Choosing a destination

Before choosing a destination, even in Canada, determine whether you will be required to quarantine for 14 days once you arrive there.

2. Plan your route and location.

- Map out which roadways and provinces you will pass through so you can check on relevant travel advisories, such as changes to rest-area facilities.
- Plan and map out in advance where you will get gas, how long you'll drive each day and what time of day you'll be passing through higher traffic areas.
- Call ahead to confirm local attractions and hotels are open so you can understand capacity limits and make reservations where possible.
- Confirm reservations for any overnight stays.
- ☐ If you are planning to eat in a restaurant be sure to call ahead and see if it is open and whether there is a longer-than-usual wait time because of reduced capacity.

3. Ensure your overnight stays will be safe.

- Check with your hotel to find out what their protocols are for cleaning and sanitizing and their plan is for protecting guests and staff.
- Ask the hotel if they have a plan for anyone who falls ill, e.g. access to Covid testing or local medical facilities.
- Ask for a room that has been vacant for a few days to minimize the risk from a previous guest.
- Ask if there is contactless check-in and check-out.
- When you arrive, consider sanitizing your room especially the high touch surfaces such as light switches, door handles, TV remotes, flat surfaces on which you'll rest your belongings and bathroom fixtures.
- If you can, open the windows for ventilation.
- Fold bedspreads and store in a closet as they may not be cleaned frequently.
- Order room service instead of eating in a restaurant. If you order room service, ask for contactless delivery.
- Decline housekeeping services to minimize the number of people in and out of your room.

4. Prepare your vehicle.

Service your vehicle before setting out on a trip and have the mechanic inspect it for any issues.

Check the tires to ensure there is sufficient tread for safe driving.

Ensure that the spare tire is fully inflated and there is a jack in the car.

Pack an <u>emergency kit</u> in your car, including a first aid kit and an extra key.

5. Pack to protect and sanitize.

Pack hand sanitizer, disinfecting wet wipes, sanitizing wipes, sanitizing spray, extra face masks, disposable gloves, and sealable disposable plastic bags and tissues.

Ensure you have all your travel documentation, including any health insurance information you might need.

6. Take proper precautions at rest stops and gas stations.

- Try not to touch anything at rest stops. Wear gloves (or substitute plastic sandwich bags) as a barrier between your skin and restroom surfaces.
- Wear a mask if you cannot socially distance (at least 6 feet or 2 metres).

☐ If there is an exit door in the public restroom, use a piece of paper towel to touch the door handle, and then dispose of it.

○ When pumping gas, use disposable gloves (or plastic sandwich bags) instead of wiping down the nozzle, keypad and touch screens, and then dispose of them in the trash.

Try using your knuckle instead of your fingertips to press buttons, and finish with hand sanitizer.

7. Avoid using cash and try to use touchless payment options*

- As much as possible use touchless payment options, not cash.
- If you must use cash, place it on the counter rather than handing it directly to the cashier.
- Do not to touch your face after handling paper money and coins.
- Use hand sanitizer after all transactions. *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

8. Dining – Sanitize your space before you eat.

- Plan for avoiding contact with others by packing refreshments and snacks to enjoy on the road.
- ☐ If eating restaurant food, consider drive-through or curbside pick-up as options to avoid as much contact with others as possible.
- If eating in a restaurant is unavoidable, wipe your table with a disinfectant wipe and use hand sanitizer afterwards.
- If you must buy food and supplies, follow all recommended precautions, including wearing a mask.

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
